# Restoring the Broken and Grieving



**D**esbeline was washing clothes in the river near her house in Haiti when suddenly the ground shifted beneath her and rocks started tumbling down on top of her.

A 7.8 magnitude earthquake had rocked the entire southern coast of Haiti—killing more than 2,000 people and destroying hundreds of thousands of homes.

Desbeline, a mother of two, was knocked unconscious and awoke to find her left hand crushed in the rockslide. She ran home to her family, praying as she went that everyone was OK. When she arrived, her children were screaming and crying outside what used to be their home.

Everything was now gone. Nearby, the home of Desbeline’s brother had also collapsed, with her brother and two-year-old niece trapped inside. They didn’t make it out, both dying trapped underneath the rubble.

As Desbeline dug through piles and piles of concrete and splintered wood, the first sign of hope was in a baby’s cry. Desbeline couldn’t believe that her youngest nephew, Adonnia, had survived, even as the home had crumbled around him.

Desbeline’s family didn’t know where to turn in the immediate, traumatic aftermath. “It’s up to God,” she said. “He’s the only One who’s going to know how to help me.”

Desbeline and Adonnia desperately needed medical attention. Desbeline’s hand was broken and infection was quickly spreading, while Adonnia could no longer bear weight on his left leg. They were each referred to the Samaritan’s Purse Emergency Field Hospital.

Our teams transformed an empty field and basketball court into a 36-bed



hospital complete with an operating theatre and pharmacy. Here, Desbeline received critical surgery to set the broken bones in her hand, and Adonnia’s leg was casted.

We airlifted the Emergency Field Hospital, along with tons of relief supplies, to Haiti on four DC-8 flights. The Samaritan’s Purse DC-8 aircraft carried more than 285 tons of cargo on 12 relief missions in 2021, including

multiple flights to northern Ethiopia after months of internal conflict left millions of families without access to basic necessities.

Wherever God leads our teams to respond, they do so in Jesus’ Name, sharing the eternal hope of the Gospel while meeting physical needs and relieving suffering.

# EMERGENCY FOOD & MEDICINE



**ETHIOPIA:** The Samaritan's Purse DC-8 aircraft carried more than 285 tons of cargo on 12 relief missions to countries such as Ethiopia, where displaced people living in the Tigray region were in desperate need. The airlifts included ready-to-use supplemental food supplies to help children at risk for severe malnutrition, as well as solar lanterns and rolls of tarp for repairing or constructing shelters. Canadian Disaster Assistance Response Team members deployed 15 times to help distribute these supplies in Tigray and provide medical care with the compassion of Christ.

## COVID-19 CRISIS

**INDIA:** When a deadly wave of COVID-19 overwhelmed India's health system, Samaritan's Purse Canada worked with local partners to reduce suffering in Jesus' Name. Some of the first calls for help came from healthcare workers facing the crisis without protective equipment. In other regions, we established a medical center and met desperate hunger needs. **In total, generous donors made it possible to provide 16,500 pieces of personal protective equipment, support 40 health facilities, and help more than 34,000 people with emergency food. We praise God for the opportunity to share the Gospel with more than 30,000 people.**

# Caring for Afghan Evacuees



**T**hey had to escape. If they failed, their lives likely would be finished. The Taliban had taken back Afghanistan by force, pushing the country into turmoil and imperiling hundreds of thousands of people. The world watched in horror as chaos enveloped Kabul airport and then sickening scenes began unfolding. People fell to their death after hanging onto airplanes during takeoff. Others were wounded when the Taliban fired shots into the mass of people desperately waiting to leave. Scores were killed in a bomb attack. We thank God that many thousands did escape, like Sadia's\* family.

Sadia, her husband, and two-year-old daughter temporarily resettled along the Albanian coastline, where Samaritan's Purse had quickly deployed in Jesus' Name to serve hundreds of hurting Afghan families. Our teams distributed relief items, led trauma healing courses, and ran a medical clinic. As we helped to meet critical needs, we also reminded evacuees that God loves them and they are not alone or forgotten.

Sadia was thankful for the diapers she received in an infant care kit distributed by our teams. "These will help a lot because it's hard for us to buy these supplies because we don't have any income," Sadia said.

## Welcoming Our Afghan Neighbors

Families like Sadia's are now seeking to resettle in countries where they can begin building a new life and a bright future. After helping dozens of families get out of Afghanistan—including our in-country partners—we began working to help many resettle in Canada and other countries.

Alongside partnering churches, this unique opportunity is a wonderful way to demonstrate Christ's compassion to people. In the United States, the Samaritan's Purse Afghan Resettlement Program is also assisting families by connecting them with sponsoring churches.



## Philippines / Typhoon Rai



Super Typhoon Rai caused major destruction and left hundreds of thousands of people displaced. Our country office in the Philippines began preparing a response even before the storm hit, quickly deploying staff who worked with local church partners to meet urgent needs.

Samaritan's Purse distributed more than 200 tons of emergency relief supplies, such as food, hygiene kits, shelter, and water filtration kits among nearly 300,000 beneficiaries. We also installed several desalination treatment systems.

## Bringing Relief When Disasters Hit Home

Zack\* wanted to leave 2021 behind.

In February, the Abbotsford, BC farmer saw his father suffer serious injuries from a fall. Just two months later, Zack contracted COVID-19. He was able to recover, but then came the next blow: a summer heatwave killed about 2,000 of his chickens.

And there was still more hardship to come. Just a few weeks before Christmas, catastrophic rains overwhelmed his property and thousands of others around Abbotsford, Merritt, and other British Columbia communities. Highways washed away and more than 15,000 residents had to flee.

Zack's home and every farm building were swamped, along with his fields of blueberry plants. Zack managed to save 12,000 chickens, but 13,000 drowned.

"I just want my house back," said the quiet, subdued husband and father of two while sitting on a picnic bench outside his home. Inside, Samaritan's Purse relief teams were hard at work. Partnering with local churches, they were there for families like Zack's.

At no cost to him and his family, the volunteers removed waterlogged furniture, drywall, and insulation from the finished basement, then applied a mold-fighting spray. All this prepared the house for repair, saving Zack untold hours of work.

"It's unexpected and appreciated," Zack said while volunteers in protective Tyvek suits carried bags of broken-up drywall past him to the curb.

"There's been so much uncertainty, so it's good to have help because we've been on our own for a lot of stuff that had to be done."

Darrin, who led the Samaritan's Purse volunteer team, noted, "Zack was just a walking zombie when we first arrived. But then he walked into the basement



[after the first day of clean-up] and said, 'it even smells fresher.'"

Other Samaritan's Purse volunteers and staff helped operate an emergency evacuation center in Abbotsford in the immediate aftermath of the flooding. We praise God for opening this new ministry area for our Canadian Disaster Relief efforts in 2021.

**By the time our flood relief work ended in Abbotsford and Merritt, we had provided physical and spiritual help to 234 families, plus 120 people staying at the evacuation shelter.**

Samaritan's Purse long-term recovery staff have now begun work in both communities. They are serving with local churches to help meet the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of families. This includes connecting them with resources needed to repair damaged property, access to trauma care, and other support.

We also continued working with residents who lost their homes to 2020 flooding in the northern Alberta community of Fort Vermilion. We have had staff on the ground to help homeowners through the complicated and time-consuming task of moving their homes away from the Peace River.

### British Columbia Wildfires

During the hot, dry summer of 2021, wildfires ravaged many homes and communities, including the village of Lytton. There, almost every home was damaged or destroyed.

Working out of our specialized Disaster Relief Unit tractor trailers in Cache Creek and Vernon, our staff trained and equipped volunteers to help affected homeowners. Working in scorching heat in full protective gear, these dedicated volunteers cleaned up fire-damaged properties and searched through ashes and rubble to find anything valuable that might have survived the flames.

Jerry\* was grieving not just for the loss of his home, but for what he believed was the likely loss of

a precious family heirloom: his father's Second World War medals. They, and almost everything Jerry owned, burned in the terrible wildfires.

Nevertheless, when he invited Samaritan's Purse volunteers to sift through the ashes of his property, he asked them to try to find these precious family possessions.

To his surprise the volunteers found them! As they pulled the irreplaceable items from the ruins, it brought Jerry a little bit of hope amid all the destruction and he gratefully thanked the volunteers for their work.

### Responding to COVID-19

Our teams also shared the hope of Jesus Christ in COVID-19 crises in northern Ontario.

The communities of Thunder Bay and Attawapiskat confronted significant COVID-19 outbreaks that put residents and people experiencing homelessness under immense pressure.

Responding to requests for help, our staff and volunteers spent several weeks in the two communities, providing supplies and helping people in isolation.

**During 2021, over 1,000 volunteers spread out across the country to help hurting homeowners.** From floods to fires to COVID-19 outbreaks, they logged more than 2,700 work hours and demonstrated God's love to over 340 families, plus 280 people struggling with COVID-19. **We praise God that 16 people came to faith in Christ through these disaster responses.**

# Changing Lives Through Water

It's a stifling day in Cambodia's remote northwest, and 10-year-old Maly\* feels the heat. Her thirst needs to be quenched, but there are no chilled bottles of water waiting for her in a fridge, no faucet to pour cold water into a glass.

Today she has one choice—untreated pond water—and it will likely make her sick. Again. Maly's parents spend most of their time working in the family's rice and cassava fields. Meanwhile, Maly does her best to attend school, but waterborne illness is a huge barrier.

Fever and diarrhea often keep her home. Unfortunately—from a health perspective—her school isn't a better place to be. There's no safe water there either, and even the little water that is available isn't enough for students to use in the school latrine or for washing their hands.

Instead of using the neglected, unlocked, and sometimes-broken latrine, students opt to use the bushes behind the school for a bathroom. As a result, the schoolyard is smelly and unsanitary. Poisonous snakes also camouflage in the grass, posing a serious danger to students' safety.

Maly's need, and that of her school, was great. Every year, children like her miss 272 million school days from diarrhea caused by waterborne and hygiene-related diseases. For many others, these diseases are deadly. Girls are at particular risk without good hygiene facilities, and many drop out of school.

Samaritan's Purse staff reached out to Maly's school and offered to help. Teachers were trained in healthy hygiene practices. The community was encouraged to rally around the school's needs too.

With support from our teams, residents helped fix the school latrine, and Samaritan's Purse constructed a large community BioSand Water Filter onsite so students and others in Maly's village can access clean water every day.

Inspired by the improvements at her school and the hygiene lessons she received, Maly asked her parents to build a latrine at their home too. Now she enjoys a much healthier environment at home and school.

Ever faithful to spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ, our staff shared the Gospel. The spiritual parallels weren't lost

on young Maly: "My problem was taken away by having clean water and a latrine, but my sin is taken away by having the blood of Jesus Christ," she said.

She asked Jesus to be the Savior of her life and now likes to read her Bible and sing worship songs in her free time. She also attends a small prayer group in her village every week.

Praise God that thirsty souls are being satisfied not only with clean water, but also with "living water" (John 4:10, ESV).

Over 800,000 people die each year from diseases caused by unclean water, inadequate sanitation, and poor hygiene habits. The majority are like Maly, children living in poverty.

Providing clean water, coupled with health and hygiene education, is perhaps the most effective way to prevent infectious and waterborne disease. Samaritan's Purse puts Canadian donations to work around the world by providing clean water and promoting safe hygiene practices, all in Jesus' Name.

**With generous support in 2021, we were able to provide 2,731 families with household water filters, install 24 community filters, and give more than 39,000 people access to safe water.**

## KENYA: A DRINK OF LIVING WATER

A rural village in Kenya was left without a nearby source of clean water after its only borehole well was destroyed by flash flooding. Families were forced to draw murky water from a dam several kilometers away, and with each household's share being rationed, there was never enough.

Samaritan's Purse rehabilitated the well and installed a solar-powered pump that transports water to a community storage tank. Our staff also shared the Word of God with the community and were blessed to see 34 people come to faith in Jesus Christ.

The community was amazed that people who had never met them were willing to work so hard on their behalf.

"It is the love of God," said Miriam,\* the wife of a local pastor. Their congregation is now constructing a church building, which had been stalled for years due to the water shortage. Miriam considers this water project a fulfillment of Psalm 121:1-2: "I lift up my eyes to the hills—from whence comes my help? My help comes from the Lord, Who made heaven and earth."

## Shoebox Gifts Open Doors for the Gospel

Romina had heard stories from the Bible but never in the way they were told during an Operation Christmas Child outreach event in her village in the mountains of Ecuador. The Word of God came alive to Romina, age 12, as she listened intently to the Gospel explained in simple, engaging terms. Overwhelmed by Jesus' love for her, Romina prayed to receive Him as her Lord and Savior.

Then, when Romina opened her shoebox gift at the event, the first thing she saw on top of the other items in the box was exactly what she had spent weeks praying for—special colored markers. Romina had dreamed of honing her drawing skills with markers like these. This special provision confirmed to Romina that she can always go to God with every one of her needs.

Last year, 10.5 million children in over 100 countries and territories received gift-filled shoeboxes and heard the Good News of the Gospel through Operation Christmas Child. Eleven countries, including Canada, participated in packing shoeboxes. Canadians lovingly packed and sent 413,875 shoebox gifts to children. Over four million shoebox recipients joined our follow-up discipleship program, The Greatest Journey, with more than two million boys and girls making decisions for Christ.

Operation Christmas Child is made possible by the faithful prayers and support of volunteers, churches, and shoebox packers. In 2021, over 6,600 volunteers served in our Calgary processing center to prepare shoeboxes for international shipment. We also thank God for the 14,200 volunteers who serve year-round globally with Operation Christmas Child.

### To the Ends of the Earth

Taking the Gospel to the ends of the earth means journeying to where few, if any, outsiders have ever been. On Vanua Levu, a remote island in Fiji, a Christian volunteer named Unaisi had never had access to Bible teaching materials until



The Greatest Journey came to the island.

Equipped with a teacher's guide and colorful Bible story illustrations, Unaisi invited children to participate in The Greatest Journey, our 12-lesson discipleship program for shoebox recipients. The 45 students received individual booklets including the Bible lessons, also a first for the village.

Two of her older students, Luisa and Ana, showed a particular interest

in the Bible stories and each committed their lives to the Lord. They were baptized after graduating from the discipleship program.

"The Greatest Journey has helped many children here learn about God's work in their lives, which has enabled them to tell others about what the Lord has done," Unaisi said. "The Greatest Journey has helped many children like Luisa and Ana come to know our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

# “God Gave us a Path When we Lost our Way”

In Cambodia, Bopha\* and Chann\* were exhausted. Thirsty and hungry, they had traveled many kilometers on foot to reach a border crossing between their country and Thailand.

That’s when they found a migrant access center operated by Samaritan’s Purse and made possible by generous donors. The center is a refuge for exhausted migrant workers or those fleeing human traffickers.

Bopha and Chann had been raising five children on a farm in rural Cambodia. They worked hard to pay the medical bills for two of their ailing sons. But a severe drought killed their crops, and the two buffalo they owned were stolen.

Bopha and Chann had to borrow money to feed their children. And to pay off their debt, the two migrated to Thailand in search of better wages. But human traffickers exploit desperate situations like theirs.

The couple was betrayed. They paid a broker to help them find good jobs. Instead, they were taken to low-paying, back-breaking construction work. Six months later, the pandemic hit, and they were jobless.

They then learned that one of their sons was critically ill, and the worried parents began the long journey home. When Bopha and Chann thought they couldn’t go much further, they came to the migrant access center.

Tens of thousands of people find help and hope here each year—even more since the pandemic caused

mass unemployment. Families receive basic needs, including food, water, medicine, shelter, and other support like transportation to their communities.

They also learn how to avoid human traffickers, who will try to trap them on their way home. Most importantly, God helps those who are weary and exploited to experience His compassionate love and Good News.

Our team made a way for Bopha and Chann to reach their family and recommended a doctor to care for their son. They also shared the Gospel, and the couple responded wholeheartedly,

choosing to put their faith in Jesus Christ, their Savior. Praise God!

“God gave us food when we were hungry and gave us a path when we lost our way,” Bopha said with joy.

**Samaritan’s Purse trained almost 10,000 people on safe migration and trafficking awareness and prevention. We also provided more than 16,000 women with livelihood training, so they could provide for themselves and their families.**

# STANDING WITH BELIEVERS UNDER FIRE

**SOUTHEAST ASIA:** Samaritan's Purse is working alongside the persecuted Church around the world. Our local partners and staff distribute food, give livelihood support, provide medical care, encourage pastors, offer trauma counseling, and advocate for believers in prison. In Southeast Asia, our partner runs workshops that gather government officials, police, and church leaders to discuss topics like religious freedom. God uses these conversations to address misconceptions and share the Good News. Just two weeks after one seminar, three Christians who had been arrested were freed. Praise God!



## EMPOWERING WOMEN AT RISK

**UGANDA AND ETHIOPIA:** Samaritan's Purse Canada continues to help women and girls trapped in prostitution in East Africa. We support dedicated local partners that provide yearlong programs giving women and children a way to escape sexual exploitation. Women receive safe housing, Biblically-based counseling, vocational training, and a community filled with Christ's love. **In 2021, more than 100 women trapped in prostitution had a chance to start life anew.** "I feel safe when I think about tomorrow because God is the one who gave me the chance to get out of prostitution," Eshe\* said in Ethiopia.

# Meeting Rising Global Hunger in Jesus' Name

**W**hat will we eat today? What will my family have tomorrow? These are questions people are asking around the world. It has been one of the severe impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic—the number of people facing critical levels of hunger and malnutrition is rising dramatically.

“It becomes a little harder,” said 50-year-old Julianna, a mother of four and grandmother of five trying to meet the needs of her family in Nicaragua.

“Because of COVID-19, my children are unemployed, and there are families in our community lacking the basics to live. It seems none of us will be able to work soon, so we have almost no income, and the children’s nutritional needs can’t be met,” said Julianna.

Starting in 2020 and continuing in 2021, God called Samaritan’s Purse to meet this growing hunger problem in Jesus’ Name. Like in Matthew 14, when Jesus saw the hungry crowd, He said to His disciples: “*They do not need to go away. You give them something to eat.*”

Worldwide, Samaritan’s Purse food projects rapidly expanded last year. From the Philippines to Kenya to Nicaragua, agriculture projects grew to help small-plot farmers and families develop resilient, plentiful crops and home gardens. **In 2021, we provided agriculture training to almost 8,000 people and distributed nearly 16,000 cows, chickens, fish, pigs, goats, and rabbits to families in need.**

Livestock projects are supporting hardworking people like Julianna to raise animals that can supply vital nutrition and income for today, and sustain their families into the future. Faithful donors gave Julianna resources to meet her family’s essential needs through chickens and pigs. She had tried to raise them in the past but was never able to produce enough.

Now, with the right tools and training, Julianna’s animals are growing, and so is her hope. “My dream is to see a chicken farm that generates resources to improve my quality of life,” she said.

“It’s wonderful to multiply animals and also multiply our income. Because of the livestock project, I am able to share with my children and their families.”

Julianna is also sharing her new faith in Jesus Christ. Every food project is a God-given opportunity to talk about Him. Our teams even use Biblical principles to teach families about growing food that will sustain them in good times and bad. This is where Julianna heard about Jesus.

“I met Jesus through the Biblical studies,” she said. “Accepting Christ was the best decision that I could have made in my life. Before, I was not a Christian. I was blind, but now that I came to the feet of Christ, I have eternal life...I want to impact the members of my community.”

We praise God for what He is doing in the lives of people like Julianna. Elsewhere, **Samaritan’s Purse Canada**



**also distributed over 450,000 meals and emergency food parcels** for families facing immediate and severe hunger. This included a container of highly nutritious vegetable soup mix—grown by Canadian farmers—to sustain Venezuelan migrants in Colombia.

## Doctor Sees “What God’s Doing on a Bigger Scale”

Canadians with bad hips or knees usually get treatment in a year or two. But in places like Angola, people are often forced to live for decades with painful, debilitating physical conditions.

That shocking reality moved orthopedic surgeon Kelly Johnston to accept an invitation to bring a team, and specialized supplies, to the struggling African nation and bring relief in Jesus’ Name.

“The biggest thing that stands out in my mind is seeing what God’s doing on a bigger scale,” said the 45-year-old Calgary resident. “It was pretty awesome. Yes, we were being the hands and feet of Christ, but what it was doing in our own lives was pretty awesome.”

It was Kelly’s second medical trip to Angola. His first, in 2004, came on the invitation of Steve Foster, son of famed, Canadian-trained, African missionary surgeon Robert Foster.

Steve, an Angolan surgeon, and Kelly stayed in touch, and when Steve encountered patients with serious chronic knee and hip problems, he asked Kelly to come to Angola for 10 days to help.

Kelly put together the team and collected the equipment—including implants and instruments—needed to carry out the surgeries. Donations from medical supply firms were very helpful, as were donations and fundraising by Kelly’s son’s peewee hockey club team.

When Kelly and the team arrived at the Samaritan’s Purse-supported hospital in Angola, their goal was to carry out 14 hip and knee replacements in 10 days, “so we had to have a lot of equipment,” Kelly said.

Looking back, Kelly noted that getting everything to Angola in time, through the efforts of World Medical Mission, “was pretty nip-and-tuck. It really forced us to rely on the Lord. We didn’t want to show up in Angola and have equipment stuck in customs.”

The five-member team ended up doing 13 surgeries because they were seconded to work on an accident victim. “It was by far the most challenging thing we did there because it was a complex operation with limited equipment,” Kelly said.

“Steve and the group at the hospital were loving on people who didn’t have much. God knitted everything together to make a successful trip. It was meeting the needs not only of the patients, but

also the people who went,” he said.

When they returned to Calgary, “I asked one of the team members about the trip, and he said it was the best thing he’d ever done in his entire life...[the team members] were blown away by the generosity and focus of the people working at the hospital,” Kelly reflected.
