Rebuilding on a Strong Foundation

"That's my house," said a woman named Mithu, pointing at cracked and teetering stone walls on a mountainside in Nepal. "We can't live there anymore. It's not safe for my children."

Mithu and her family were among millions in Nepal who lost their homes in the 7.8-magnitude earthquake on April 25, 2015. They were cold, hungry, and living under a patchwork tent when Samaritan's Purse arrived with food and blankets. "I am so happy you came to help us," Mithu said. "It gives us hope." In the days following the

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earthquake, the Lord opened doors for us to reach over 60.000 families with food, kitchen kits, tarps, blankets, hygiene items, and other emergency supplies. Our medical team traveled by

U.S. military helicopters to some of the most remote and hardest-hit regions to care for hundreds of sick and injured survivors.

Relief work was complicated by Nepal's landlocked location in the Himalavan mountains between India and China, as well as by a powerful aftershock that struck on May 12. Within weeks of the disaster, we chartered a series of relief flights into the nation's only airport and transported 110 truckloads of emergency supplies across the treacherous mountains into the nation's capital, Kathmandu.

construct sturdy temporary housing to give them safe and dry places to live while they rebuild their homes. The shelter kits they received included metal sheeting and framework, tarp, wire, gloves, and a toolkit.

Prem Kumari Gurung, 45, walked for several hours with her family to obtain the materials. She already had sold some of her meager possessions to purchase sheet metal for a new structure, but it wasn't sufficient. She was





anxious about the future.

The shelter kit she received from Samaritan's Purse enabled her to finish building their shelter. "I was worried about how I was going to build a house," she said. "But now I have all of these things. I am happy and relieved."

In addition to shelters, we have also provided safe water and sanitation for schools and tent camps, food for vulnerable families, and other desperately needed items for tens of thousands of people. Our work to provide physical relief in Jesus' Name was noticed by Nepal's prime minister, who asked if we would bring supplies to Himalayan villages to help disaster victims survive the brutal winter. Our team immediately began working around the clock to put together our 10th airlift of supplies, including blankets and coats, from Charlotte, N.C. to Kathmandu in mid-January 2016. The items were flown by Nepali military helicopters to small Himalayan villages over 8,000 feet above sea level, where our staff distributed them to thousands of desperate families. Nepal's home affairs minister, Shakti Bahadur Basnet, joined our team in delivering the relief supplies. "We would like to deeply thank Samaritan's Purse on behalf of the people of the Nepal government and the people here," he said. "We'd like to thank them from the bottom of our heart." We praise God for enabling us to share the Gospel in word and deed with the people of Nepal. As we continue to work hand-in-hand with local churches there, we look forward to even more opportunities to

share the compassion of Christ and the Good News of salvation.

MIDDLE EAST REFUGEES

Crossing Over to a New Life

The Greek island of Lesvos is barely two miles from the shores of Turkey, but the crossing is deadly. Refugees fleeing from Syria and other Middle Eastern countries pay smugglers up to \$1,000 for the trip, though they know that thousands before them have drowned.

By the time they arrive on the rocky shores of Lesvos or other Greek islands, most are shivering and soaked. And that's where they meet workers from Samaritan's Purse who greet them at the shores with physical relief and the compassion of Christ. We have been working for years in the Middle East to help refugees fleeing from conflict and terror in Syria and Iraq. Last year, we deployed teams to several countries in southeastern Europe to minister to vulnerable families searching for safety and a chance at a new life.

These refugees travel from Greece and Macedonia via Serbia and Croatia on their



way to Austria and beyond. Along the way, Samaritan's Purse staff and local partners work hand-inhand to provide blankets, water, food, and other basic necessities for tens of thousands of people.

Refugees have multiple contacts with Samaritan's Purse as they make their way through Europe in places like Mytilene, Athens, and Macedonia—all places the Apostle Paul visited during his missionary journeys.

In 2015, our teams fed 64,000 refugees and distributed 55,000 blankets and 133,000 bottles of water. We also winterized hundreds of temporary housing units in Greece by installing heaters, floors, and insulation. Many of these Muslim refugees are eager to hear the truth about Jesus. We have established "Meeting Places" where Christian workers who are fluent in Arabic and Farsi share the Gospel, hand out Bibles, answer questions, and pray with those who want to accept Jesus as their Lord and Savior.

At one refugee camp in Croatia, a man from Iraq met one of our team members outside a Muslim prayer tent. He had found a Bible and had prayed that someone would come to tell him more about Jesus. Our staff member explained the Gospel to him and led him in prayer to repent of his sins and accept Christ into his heart.

A young mother from Syria arrived at a train station in Austria carrying her 9-monthold baby and a Samaritan's Purse backpack filled with supplies. When a local Christian woman offered to help her, the mother asked, "Are you from Samaritan's Purse too?" She had encountered several of our teams along her journey who had made a profound impression on her.

The Austrian Christian woman wrote to let us know that she was able to reap the spiritual harvest from the seeds the Lord had sown through Samaritan's Purse. "She prayed with me to

receive Christ today!" she said. "It was such a sweet, unexpected moment, and I wanted to let you know God is using you. I believe that you being there at a time when she had nothing, and showing her God's love through your actions, allowed her heart to be open today. Praise God and keep doing all you do because God is working in amazing ways!"

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A Listening Ear and a Glimmer of Hope

Thanks to you, Samaritan's Purse is providing compassionate care to traumatized, desperate Iraqis

For tens of thousands of Iraqis who have fled war and the terrorism of ISIS, the country's northern region is a relative safe haven.

But they come bearing burdens that most Canadians can't even imagine. Many of these internally displaced people have been forced to watch as friends and family members have been raped or murdered.

Others have escaped from bondage, beatings, or vicious sexual assaults with emotional scars that may never heal.

Still more have seen their homes destroyed and their possessions stolen, with little choice but to run for their lives with nothing or be kidnapped or killed.Even though these Iraqis are away from the violence, their hope for the future is faint. Will they ever be able to return to their home towns? Will their homes still exist? How can they make ends meet or provide their children with an education? Our team has completed renovations to turn an abandoned night club into a community center where we are offering internally displaced Iraqis sewing, carpentry, and computer training.

> Our center staff also provide trauma counseling and medical services, plus a variety of safe, child-friendly spaces and activities.

As these families try to deal with their difficult experiences and their current circumstances, Samaritan's Purse staff are also simply being available for Iraqis to listen to their stories and receive a taste of Christ's unconditional love and support.

This ministry is vital for the many men who've lost their livelihoods and loved ones and have become despondent. The women who have been sexually assaulted and stigmatized are given a safe and caring place where they can share their grief. Children who have lost siblings or parents find the love and comfort they so desperately need.

The mother and siblings of twelve-yearold Sameerah and her sister Hadiah, 13, are being held captive by ISIS. The two sisters were also kidnapped, but managed to escape after their mother urged them to appear dirty and mentally ill. They escaped being raped or forced to become brides to ISIS soldiers.

Now, Sameerah and Hadiah are in Northern Iraq, living with their uncle and grandparents, and anxiously hoping their mother and siblings can join them there. They visit our community center regularly, where our staff offer them compassion and comfort.

We are grateful for God-given opportunities to tell these children, and thousands more displaced Iraqis of all ages, that they are loved and that Jesus Christ gave His life for them.

Samaritan's Purse has been providing spiritual and physical help in Northern Iraq long before the refugee crisis became newsworthy. With your donations and prayers, we will continue ministering there long after the world's attention has moved on.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

Spanning the Globe with Good News, Great Joy

We praise God for giving Samaritan's Purse more opportunities than ever before to share the Good News of Christ through our Operation Christmas Child project.

This past year, we collected 11.2 million gift-filled shoeboxes and distributed them through churches and Christian partners to children in 104 countries who are hurting because of poverty, war, disaster, or disease.

To help children understand, we also supply a colorful Gospel booklet called *The Greatest Gift*, which we make available in 77 languages. Multiplying the Gospel Impact of Shoebox Gifts

We praise God that more than a million children made decisions for Christ in 2015 through The Greatest Journey, the follow-up discipleship program Samaritan's Purse developed for boys and girls who receive our Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts.

rom God's creation to the fall of man to Christ's resurrection, children learn about the consequences of sin and God's plan for redemption through The Greatest Journey classes. They memorize Scripture, are invited to trust Jesus as their Savior, and learn how to share their faith with family and friends. Boys and girls who complete the 12-lesson Bible study receive a certificate and a New Testament in their own language. This equips them to continue to grow as disciples of Christ. In the past five years, 7.5 million children have participated in The Greatest Journey, including nearly 2.8 million in 2015.

"The parents started coming"

A fter the children receive the Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes, we invite them to participate in The Greatest Journey. During the course, we teach them about Jesus and how He gave His life for them because He loves them.

The children often go home and tell their families what they learn in class. The parents then want to come to The Greatest Journey course with their sons

and daughters. When we first had family members come, one of our teachers held the children's class under the mango tree, and I taught the adults in the shelter.

Now, the families are coming to church on Sundays too-all because the children went home and told Bible stories. We are thankful to God for using The Greatest Journey to grow our church and change our community.

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WATER PROJECTS

stor, an 11-year-old boy who lives with **IN** his grandparents in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), was among the millions of people who live without access to safe water. They are forced to drink from filthy ponds, streams, or contaminated wells. Nestor and his family, including his six-

year-old brother, have lived most of their 0 lives with the reality that their next sip of

water could prove deadly. "I often was sick, suffering from stomach aches from parasites in the water," says Nestor. "There were many days me and my little brother could not attend school because

of being sick from the water." In DRC, which is the most impoverished country in Africa, less than 20 per cent of the population has access to safe drinking water and only about 10 per cent has access to proper sanitation. The DRC has among the world's highest death rates in children, with most of those deaths from diarrhea caused by drinking contaminated water.

Globally, more than 340,000 children younger than five die annually from diarrheal diseases due to poor sanitation and hygiene, or unsafe drinking water. That's almost 1,000 children per day. Roughly one-fifth of those deaths are occurring in the DRC.

"It's sometimes difficult for Canadians to

great things, but aren't able to due to the sickness they have from drinking unsafe water," says Tutu. "In Canada, the situation is very different, but we should care. We are all human, and should care for each other and help one another when in need."

Thanks to the generosity of concerned Canadians, Samaritan's Purse is providing safe water around the world with the Canadian-designed BioSand Filter, which provides enough water for a family, and the Samaritan Filter, which provides enough water for hundreds of people.

Nestor and his family were the first to receive a BioSand Filter in DRC, and Nestor is among the hundreds of students in two schools in the Patu village who now have Samaritan Filters. This means students will miss far fewer days of class due to illness and live healthier lives.

"We have good drinking water now without germs or microbes," says Nestor. "We are no longer sick because of dirty water."

Samaritan's Purse and Canadian donations have provided the 600 students attending primary and secondary schools in Nestor's community with proper latrines and handwashing stations for the first time.

Nestor is also among a group of students who are part of a WASH (water, sanitation, and hygiene) club. They are trained to use and maintain Samaritan Filters, and to promote handwashing and proper sanitation among fellow students.

The need remains great, however. Thousands more in this region alone still need safe water and proper sanitation. Together, we are giving children safe water at home and at school, so they are able to live, learn, and grow towards a brighter future. One home, one school, one community at a time, together we can make the world a healthier place.

Building towards a healthier future

Ana Savala's family is one of many in rural Nicaragua suffering with poor health from unsafe water. They had no choice but to drink from wells they know are making them sick.

Much of the drinking water in rural Nicaragua is contaminated by agricultural runoff.

As a result, kidney and intestinal diseases are common and result in as many as two deaths every month in small communities.

Financial donations by people like you are enabling Samaritan's Purse to provide a solution to the water crisis in Nicaragua-and around the world-with BioSand filters. These simple yet effective Canadian-designed concrete filters are transforming dirty water into safe, drinkable water for residents in the rural municipality of Leon, about 100 km west of Managua. They are investing their time and effort to ensure a healthier future for their families by helping to build BioSand filters.

"I heard there was a team here building filters, and was told that I could work to get

"It is really hard, we are very poor, but we have to take my husband to the hospital for the medicines he needs," she says. "He shouldn't be working, because he is so sick, but we can't afford for him to be out of work." As area residents arrive to help Ana construct a BioSand filter for her home, they are welcomed with a time of prayer and Bible study. The group hears the New Testament story of the Samaritan woman at the well, in which Jesus explains that He is the living water. Samaritan's Purse staff share their Bibles

They will work alongside Samaritan's Purse staff in every stage of BioSand filter construction, from mixing and pouring cement into metal molds to create the filter body, to sifting sand or breaking rocks to create the three levels of natural filtration.

A doctor told Ana and her husband that he needed to drink bottled water to ease his kidney disease symptoms, but that is too costly for their family, as it is for most in the area.

"This [having a BioSand filter in their home] is going to be a big help," she says.

The support of Canadian donors makes it possible for families in Nicaragua to have a safe water supply and healthier future.

WORLD MEDICAL MISSION

Delivering Hope and Healing Through the Great Physician

World Medical Mission in Canada supported 16 overseas hospitals in 2015 with much-needed personnel. We sent doctors and other volunteers on short-term assignments and helped launch a new generation of medical missionaries through our Post-Residency Program.

total of 51 volunteers, including doctors, Adentists. nurses, and other medical professionals, took time away from their busy schedules to make short-term trips with World Medical Mission Canada and offer their expertise, compassion, and passion for the Gospel at understaffed mission hospitals and clinics in 13 countries in 2015 Dr. Sam Williams, a vascular surgeon, has served with World Medical Mission on 26 volunteer trips during the past 25 years, including 17 to a hospital in Togo,

West Africa. "We are glad to be a part of the

evangelistic outreach of the hospital," he said. "The work that we are able to do surgically allows us to share the Gospel with our patients."

For young Christian doctors who feel called by God to become career missionaries, our Post-Residency Program offers two-year assignments overseas. World Medical Mission Canada sent its first three doctors through Post-Residency in 2015, and another two have been accepted to go in 2016. We sent 75 people on our medical teams to run eyeglass, dental, and medical clinics.

HEALTHY CHILDREN, HEALTHY FAMILIES

Improving the Dire Realities of Open-fire Cooking

Gloria could see the writing on the wall.

Ter kitchen walls, laden with a thick layer of black soot, were a reminder that her lungs were also being damaged by decades of cooking over open fires without any kind of proper ventilation.

Gloria lives in the Nicaraguan municipality of Leon, about 140 km from Managua, the capital of Nicaragua, with her 22-year-old daughter. Like most others in this area, they and their family are plagued with health issues from poor indoor air quality.

It's most often women and children who suffer the consequences of heavy, dangerous smoke.

Gloria, her daughter, and her grandchildren-who are often in her home when she is cooking-have all struggled with respiratory issues such as asthma-like symptoms and lung infections.



"Overcoming trauma in Kenya"

am a Canadian registered psychologist and have specialized for 20 years in working with people who have experienced traumatic events. For many years I've wanted to travel to developing countries to help train and support nationals who are providing psychological assistance to survivors of traumatic events.

When I started thinking about it more seriously this past Spring, Dr. Ben Sawer and his wife Cathy suggested I join them on their trip to Kapsowar in Kenya. This is a

trip they have done at least once annually for the last eight years through World Medical Mission, a branch of Samaritan's Purse.

Kapsowar is a stunningly beautiful village on the edge of the Rift Valley in Kenya. World Medical Mission operates a small hospital there that serves the village and surrounding areas. The compound also includes a nursing school and a theological school for training pastors.

The principal of the theological school and the principal of the nursing school invited me to teach

on topics such as trauma and posttraumatic stress intervention and treatment, suicide, intervention and treatment for alcohol abuse and other addictions. When I taught on suicide prevention, and how to care for

those left behind, a young pastor sat down beside me. He told me his brother had been a soldier and when he came home he committed suicide.

"I couldn't save my brother's life, but I think now with the information I have, maybe I can save someone else's," he said. I felt his grief and his hope that his loss could be redeemed.

The second week I taught the nursing students. I could read from their faces that they were very interested in the topics, but they

were hesitant to engage. I had them write questions on paper and put them on the desk for me to respond to, and there were some great practical and personal questions.

I can't end without a comment on the leadership in Kapsowar. I was moved by the gracious dedication of the Kenyans who served the hospital and the theological school.

When I left Kapsowar to return to Canada. I took with me a world to think about and a budding desire to be part of the work that God is doing in Kapsowar, should He allow it.

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She points to the corner of her small, cement-walled kitchen. While her old stove is gone, the damage it caused her home and health is imprinted on the walls and ceiling. Thankfully, there is new hope for Gloria and other struggling families like hers. She no longer has to cook over a dangerous open fire, thanks to an innovative new stove from Samaritan's Purse, made possible by generous Canadian donors like you. This simple one-piece concrete stoveknown as a Clean Cookstove-will protect the lungs of Gloria and her family by sending all the deadly smoke safely up a chimney pipe.

"Look at my wall, and ceiling-everything is black [where her open fire used to burn]. Where my new stove is the wall is clean, and I feel better," she says.

Indoor air pollution by black carbon causes about 4.3 million deaths worldwide every year, which is more than HIV, malaria and tuberculosis combined. Most of those deaths happen in developing nations like Nicaragua, where people often don't have electricity or the means to afford safer cooking methods.

Watching her neighbor become seriously ill with respiratory disease was a frightening wake-up call, Gloria says.

"As I'm getting older, I didn't know what kind of issues were developing from the smoke that I've been breathing in all these years," she says. "My neighbor's better now because she got one of these stoves-I was so happy to hear that."

Helping Our Neighbors Return Home after Disasters

hen a massive forest fire destroyed thousands of buildings and hundreds of homes in Fort McMurray, Samaritan's Purse was soon on the ground with our specially equipped Disaster Relief Units and other emergency equipment.

Samaritan's Purse partnered with local churches, their congregations, and other Fort McMurray residents who wanted to be part of the clean-up and restoration of their city. Thanks to donations from Canadians, we

arrived in Fort McMurray with 10 staff and

two specially equipped Disaster Relief Units-transport trucks filled with a wide variety of emergency equipment including electrical generators, power tools, wheelbarrows, shovels, and personal protective equipment.

We also brought eight pick-up trucks, including some pulling trailers carrying earth-moving bobcats, a mobile warehouse of tools, and a shower unit to enable staff and volunteers to clean up after long days of dirty, tiring work. In the aftermath of similar wildfires in Slave Lake, Alberta in 2011 and in Rock Creek, British Columbia in 2015, we helped homeowners in many ways. This included sifting through the ashes of destroyed or badly damaged homes, searching for personal items that can be salvaged, and removing debris.

We also helped to remove and empty fridges and freezers that had no electricity for at least several days, and pressure-washed homes to remove soot and ash or firesuppressant stains.

Municipal officials, knowing about Samaritan's Purse Canada's long track record of responding to disasters in many Canadian communities, invited us to help in Fort McMurray.

"We know the entire community is going to be impacted by this fire, physically, emotionally, and spiritually, for months and years to come," says Brent Davis, Samaritan's Purse Disaster Response director.

Samaritan's Purse cleaned up 33 homes in Belleville, Hastings County, Foxboro, Tweed, Campbellford, and Trent Hills.

In August 2014, intense weather in the Greater Toronto Area dumped 130 mm (or almost six inches) of rain on the city

of Burlington in the course of five hours. Lalso been been deployed to provide assistance Samaritan's Purse partnered with another aid organization and 145 volunteers to help 57 families clean up their flood-damaged homes. **SASKATCHEWAN** Samaritan's Purse was invited to assist with clean-up and recovery in Melville after 200 mm (or more than six inches) of rain fell during a few brutal days in July 2014. Deploying our Calgary-based DRU and other Samaritan's Purse support, more than 340 volunteers helped clean up 89 homes. **NEW BRUNSWICK** The village of Sussex Corner experienced severe flooding in the southern New Brunswick community of 1,500

people. Ice jams and high water on waterways damaged as many as 100 homes. Deploying our Moncton-based DRU, more than 400 volunteers worked with Samaritan's Purse to clean up 72 homes and prepare them for repair SOUTHERN ALBERTA RESTORATION **PROGRAM** With the help of generous donors and 5,000 volunteers, Samaritan's Purse helped almost 800 families prepare their homes for rebuild after floods damaged much of southern Alberta in the summer of 2013. Sixty-five families in Calgary and High River

received assistance through our restoration project by the time it was completed in 2015.

OPERATION HEAL OUR PATRIOTS

Strength and Hope for the Guardians of Freedom

The summer of 2015 was a milestone for our Operation Heal Our Patriots ministry as we welcomed our first Canadian military couples couple to Alaska for a week of Biblically based marriage enrichment.

hristine Carignan, a Lieutenant Colonel, got far more than she expected when she and her husband Louis-Philippe Binette, a major in the reserves, came to Alaska to participate in Samaritan's Purse's Operation Heal Our Patriots ministry.

"I came here for marriage counseling-which I got-but I also found God," she said tearfully.

More than 500 U.S. wounded military veterans and their spouses have been guests at the Samaritan Lodge since Operation Heal Our Patriots began in 2013. For the first time in September 2015, with the financial and prayer support of Canadian donors, 10 wounded Canadian veterans and their spouses were able to participate in this unique ministry.

The couples enjoyed a variety of memorable activities, and participated in several marriage workshops that taught effective communication and other relationship skills.

Christine and Louis-Philippe, who both suffer from Operational Stress Injury, have been experiencing marriage problems since about 2011. They trace their difficulties back to a period when, because of separate training courses and deployments to Afghanistan, they saw each other for only six weeks over two years.

"We went through blaming each other (for family problems) and struggling so much," Louis-Philippe recalled. "It was ugly, and we knew we couldn't continue like that." Last Christmas in their home in Ottawa.

it would have on their four children. When a Canadian Forces padre learned of their marriage difficulties, he recommended they apply to become one of the first Canadian military couples involved in Operation Heal Our Patriots.

they discussed divorce-including the impact

Their goal in coming to Alaska was to improve their marriage. They knew Samaritan's Purse is a Christian organization, so there would likely be some prayer times and maybe scripture readings. But that was only an afterthought to a couple who'd never had a single discussion about God in 21 years of marriage.

They arrived at the Samaritan Lodge on a Sunday. The next morning, all 10 couples were treated to some kayaking lessons and a brief paddling tour. They spent the afternoon in their first marriage class. On Tuesday, couples could sign up for guided hiking, fishing, or bear-watching from a plane.

It was during the Tuesday marriage class that Louis-Philippe says God started to tug on his heart. Christine's breakthrough came the next day while she was listening to Lisa Harding, the wife of a military veteran suffering from PTSD, describe how she found her husband, Chris, trying to hang himself.

She stopped him, but he remained very depressed. Then Chris was in a terrible car accident that has left him with permanent disabilities. How has their marriage survived? Because of their strong faith in the saving power of Jesus Christ, Lisa declared.

"She (Lisa) spoke for only two or three minutes," Christine recalled. "But I saw her misery. I saw a couple going through hell. She said it was God that gave her strength. I wanted that strength. Her words were like a flame that came right at me-hitting me here," Christine said, pointing to her heart. "It hit me—God is real."

Christine shared her revelation with Louis-Philippe and they met with one of the Operation Heal Our Patriots chaplains. They asked many tough questions, including some about deep hurts in their past. Although some questions remain, they decided to put their faith in God. Chaplain Rick Lamothe led them in a prayer during which they asked God to forgive them of their sins, and committed their lives to Him.

"I think God is like my general," a smiling Christine said. "I don't have to agree with God all the time, but I still respect Him and have faith in Him because He has the big picture."

DEASE LAKE

Sharing Christ's Love with Tahltan Youth

The Samaritan's Purse Ministry Center continues to share God's love amongst the Tahltan First Nation by providing a life-giving place for youth to play, relax, eat, learn, and grow.

n weeknights at the Samaritan's Purse Ministry Center in Dease Lake, BC, local youth are pouring over schoolwork, eating supper together, battling it out on the air hockey table, or discussing topics like loving your neighbor.

A sense of community, security, and Christ's love pervades the building.

"We pray every day that they'll find Christ's love here," says Andy Northup, assistant manager at the Ministry Center. "He is having an impact in this community." The center, which has been operating

for three years in the small village close to the Yukon border, hosts about 50 children and youth each week between two tutoring sessions and three drop-in evenings.

Program Coordinator Josiah Atkins, one of eight staff who run the center, also plans extra activities for local youth. These have included running a hockey camp, staying at Bible camps, attending a Will Graham Celebration, and going to the Native Youth Conference.

Years ago while living in Alberta, Atkins brought youth to the same Christian conference; now those youth are leaders who are bringing the next generation.

"That's the dream [in Dease Lake] too-that some of the youth will be leading their own communities," says Atkins.

"We are having an impact on the youthwe're hearing that from the community," says Northup. "We can't do anything with any impact unless we're holding hands with Christ."

> What do all of them do each night after the sun sets about 6:00 p.m., and everything gets dark? They use candles for a while. then go to bed early.

Jannet's husband works on a farm and can come home only on weekends. Their daughter, the mother of their grandchild, works as a nanny and lives most of the time with her employer and so poor Jannet is responsible for 10 children most of the time.

"Lots of people tell me my life is hard," she says with remarkable stoicism. "I just have to be patient."

"It's a humbling experience to see her surroundings and how she has held it together," said Eileen Li, one of the Canadian

As Jannet, who finds comfort in her devotion to Jesus Christ, watched her children explore their new shoeboxes, she quietly noted "I wonder why Canadians do this. I imagine they have good hearts."

You can show your good heart to Jannet and thousands of other struggling families in the developing world by packing shoeboxes with school supplies, hygiene items, toys, and plenty of love.

When the children receive boxes, they and their families learn Canadians care about them. They also learn that God, "a shield to those who take refuge in him" (Proverbs 30:5, ESV), has not forgotten them either.
